The London Group was set up in 1913 by thirty two artists including Walter Sickert, Jacob Epstein, Wyndham Lewis, David Bomberg, Sylvia Gosse, Ethel Sands and Henri Gaudier Brzeska, with the aim of creating a powerful artist-run group to act as a counter-balance to institutions such as the Royal Academy. The founding group created a unique structure for an organisation, that has gone on to successfully nurture the careers of many of Britain's best-known artists.

The London Group Open represents a unique opportunity for non-members to exhibit among current members of the UK's longest-running and most prestigious artists' collective.

Embodying the group's dedication to the contemporary art scene, this open call invites entries from UK-based visual artists aged 18 and over, working in any medium.

This year, there are numerous awards open to the 79 non-member exhibiting artists.

This work revisits UK sites of last summer's Islamophobic and racist violence, a mosque, a street, and a hotel housing asylum seekers transforming them through prayer. Placing a mat where hostility flared, I reclaim space as sacred ground. Video and traces of violence form a counter-narrative of dignity, belonging, and resilience."

"The cello's sound is collected through contact microphones and transmuted through software which is then heard via the instrument's resonance chamber.

The audience is then asked to come and interact (or play) the piece through motion tracking. Arm movements change the frequency and decay, creating a three-way symphony between technology, humans and art."




